





## Where we are so far

- Translated the questionnaires in to English ©
- Teachers already trained 11<sup>th</sup> July
- Start intervention 18<sup>th</sup> October in Cardiff, 135 children aged 13-14yrs.
- First questionnaires: 12 or 15<sup>th</sup> October
- Five teachers and five staff from the University will run 5 groups:
  - 18<sup>th</sup> October
  - 23<sup>rd</sup> January
  - 9<sup>th</sup> April
  - University of South Wales Film students will partner for scripting, acting, filming and editing
  - 28<sup>th</sup> June will be the film festival

## Control group

- Piloted the questionnaires with 20 students (age 14yrs) at a Swansea school.
- This was part of a developmental module they complete to enhance there understanding of wider societal issues.
- We asked them to complete the questionnaires and comment on them.
- We then taught how forensic psychologists work with violent offenders and set a task using a case study on dating violence.
- A different group in the school were planned to be our control group.
- However, disaster strikes the head teacher changes and we have to start again! We are currently talking to the school and another school to make arrangements to run control questionnaires.



'These results suggest that when ethical guidelines are followed, it is possible to survey adolescent victims of sexual abuse on aspects related to their experience without causing them significant distress."

2.5-7.6% experienced feelings of upset when being asked the questions, the abusive history only accounted for 6.6% of the variance (i.e. it was not a factor of significance). The needs for mental health workers supporting children to use 'Routine Enquiry', to actively ask questions, not avoid the issue or pretend we don't know something traumatic has happened to them. Young Minds 'Report beyond Adversity' Helpful guidance document on asking children sensitive questions.
